Name of Project: Save Scottish Seas

Purpose: to achieve our vision of healthy, well-managed seas, where wildlife and coastal communities flourish and ecosystems are protected, connected and thriving by ensuring the effective implementation of the Marine (Scotland) Act 2010

SDG: 14

- The Save Scottish Seas campaign (<u>www.savescottishseas.org</u>) has been running for over 10 years and is a result of collective effort of SELINK members organisations to secure better marine conservation legislation and policy
- The main outcomes of the campaign so far have been to help secure the Marine (Scotland) Act 2010 and engage over 40,000 people on the measures required to implement it (marine protected areas (MPAs), marine spatial plans, etc).
- Learning from this project to date:
 - While the Scottish Government has made good progress there is still a long way to go in terms of completing the MPA network and establishing ecosystem-based Regional Marine Plans that will be required to more effectively manage activities at sea and underpin an improvement in the health of our seas.
 - Political ambition and sufficient resources are often lacking to ensure all aspects of marine conservation policy can be delivered (e.g. monitoring, compliance, cumulative impact assessment/management) and to develop policy in a timely manner (e.g. consultations on MPA proposals are currently over 4 years delayed and roll-out of regional marine planning is under-resourced).
 - MPA coverage alone is not a helpful conservation target MPAs operate most effectively as part of an ecologically coherent network of sites and are meaningless if they do not also have legally binding management measures in place to restrict damaging activity.

- Better, more holistic, management of marine activities and industries is still needed, e.g. better regulation and modernisation of inshore fisheries so that they contribute to marine ecosystem enhancement, and better regulation and licensing of marine wildlife watching tourism
- There is growing public awareness of Scottish marine conservation issues but more efforts are needed to improve engagement and participation in decision-making processes

Promotion of engagement with the SDGs

Can you suggest ways in which we could promote engagement in the SDGs more widely across Scotland? In particular how can we ensure no one is left behind with SDG implementation?

In relation to SDG 14

Local promotion of marine protected areas (e.g. information boards, educational materials) and improved mechanisms for local engagement and participation in management is needed.

Local communities should be given greater opportunities to benefit from MPAs (e.g. promote domestic sustainable seafood markets, sustainable tourism)



- Greater financial and scientific resources are needed to expedite delivery of the MPA network (including management, monitoring and compliance), Regional Marine Plans and modernisation of fisheries management, including fully documented fisheries
- Reduce Scotland's footprint so that we are consuming our 'fair share' of planetary resources

Target 14.2 – The UK-wide Marine Strategy Regulations 2010 transpose
the EU Marine Strategy Framework Directive (MSFD) and require the
development of a UK marine strategy, which "must apply an ecosystembased approach to the management of human activities within the marine
strategy area." The marine strategy is in three parts, part three describes
the programme of measures required to meet the aim of achieving Good
Environmental Status of our waters by 2020.

In Scotland this is delivered inter alia through the policies of Scotland's National Marine Plan (and in future also statutory Regional Marine Plans) https://www.gov.scot/publications/scotlands-national-marine-plan/.

Target 14.4 – It would be misguided to assume that because few convictions are reported that there is effective enforcement. Reporting in 2017 the European Court of Auditors found that more effort is needed across the EU to have an effective fisheries control system in place. Visiting Scotland the auditors found that "Scotland had by far the highest proportion of vessels with more than five infringements, with 169 single operators committing more than five infringements between 2013 and 2015. Although the fine is doubled where an infringement previously sanctioned by a fine is repeated, the number of fines applied was very small. In practice, most of the action taken following infringements involved advisory letters and verbal and written warnings. These 'soft measures' were applied even in cases of serious infringements (e.g. catching fish after the closure of the respective fishery) and the measures did not seem to prevent recurrence. Even though the inspection efforts and coverage were higher than in other Member States, the recurrence was greater, which indicates that the sanctions are less dissuasive." http://publications.europa.eu/webpub/eca/specialreports/fisheries-08-2017/en/See also the report of the House of Lords EU Energy and Environment Sub-committee inquiry on the implementation and enforcement of the EU landing obligation (the discards ban). This found little evidence of the landing obligation being followed to date and an almost unanimous view that the UK was not ready for full implementation in Jan 2019. https://www.parliament.uk/hlinguiry-implementation-enforcementlanding-obligation

- Target 14.5 It is true that the spatial target of 10% protected areas has been exceeded in Scottish waters. However, the SDG indicator 14.5.1 of protected area spatial coverage is a far narrower indicator than provided by the UN Convention on Biological Diversity's Aichi Targets where Target 11 states "By 2020, at least 17 per cent of terrestrial and inland water, and 10 per cent of coastal and marine areas, especially areas of particular importance for biodiversity and ecosystem services, are conserved through effectively and equitably managed, ecologically representative and well connected systems of protected areas and other effective area-based conservation measures, and integrated into the wider landscapes and seascapes.". On this measure Scotland is not yet meeting its obligations though has made considerable progress within the framework of EU, UK and Scots law and the Convention for the Protection of the Marine Environment in the North-East Atlantic, the OSPAR Convention. The latest progress report on the Scottish Marine Protected Area Network was laid in the Scottish Parliament in Dec 2018. https://www.gov.scot/publications/marine-protected-area-network-2018

- We also note the IUCN target for 30% of all habitat types to be protected from damaging activities which should drive an increase in ambition

Reduced or limited resources for completion of MPA network and creation of Regional Marine Plans. Lack of political will and pressure from marine industry.
