

#### Foreword from the President

As a charitable organisation committed to openness and, through its member organisations, to engagement with the people of Scotland, LINK stands ready to contribute in future to this important task.

### **Board Members' Report and Accounts** for the year ended 31 March 2011

#### **Chair's Introduction**

Despite some significant uncertainties for members and LINK around funding, the year 2010/11 has been an active, constructive and successful one in LINK, with a broad spectrum of collaborative work and no shortage of interesting and challenging projects. As usual, this has focussed on getting the environment into the debates over other mainstream concerns, keeping the environment on other agendas where it has already been admitted, influencing developing policy and legislation and continuing to nudge broader concerns up the policy agenda in Scotland.

The economic climate has focussed members' attention more than usually around their own organisations, with inevitable impacts on the available resource for collective work. Financial concerns have affected LINK too, requiring reassessment of budgets, fresh scenario planning and review of funding strategy in considering how best to adjust to a likely decline in core funding and at the same time to maintain the independent voice that members value very highly. Whilst these conversations will be with us for some time to come, they serve to underline the need for and value of joint effort. In fact, whilst we foresee some redefining of roles for LINK in our review of network strategy for 2012 to 2015, there is no doubting the added value LINK delivers, to its members, and to the debate on policies affecting the environment. LINK continues to work constructively at various levels - briefing politicians, liaising with Ministers, Government and its agencies, engaging with local government where possible, and working with stakeholders in various fields of policy, as the following pages show. This builds considerable synergy over policy development, bringing greater awareness and both foreseen and unforeseen 'wins' for environmental stewardship, the economy and for people. LINK has made a point of contributing to national discussions including the impact of budget cuts

In addition, eleven LINK task forces have been active over the year and small snapshots of their contributions over the year are outlined in this report. As any of these initiatives shows, this network's real concern is with sustainable decisions and policies that build the true value of the environment into the wider economy, consider what will best support Scotland's communities in the long term, avoid impacting our environment and our communities in ways for which future generations have to pay, and take account of our environmental footprint in the world.

At the close of the first decade of Scotland's new Parliament, LINK assessed Holyrood's impact on Scotland's environment in a report entitled Scotland's Environmental Laws - from Rhetoric to Reality. This found that despite some excellent, in some cases ground-breaking, legislation being delivered since 1999, Scotland's record in implementing legislation and following the spirit through into governance, has, so far, been more disappointing. It is part of LINK's forward strategy to pursue better implementation and sounder governance in the years ahead and we look forward to working together with our partners in Parliament, Government, Councils, civic organisations and communities, to that end.

## Board Members' Report and Accounts for the year ended 31 March 2011

#### LINK's objectives, activity and achievements

LINK's strategic objectives as the forum for environmental NGOs are threefold: pursuing sustainability in terms of development of policy that counts the contribution of the environment and the 'green' cost of decisions; being a strong, collective voice about issues that its members wish to highlight to public and decision makers; being effective as both network and collective voice and accountable to those we represent and who support us. Across LINK activity this year, as this report shows, the provision of a forum for members is vital, for exchange of information and intelligence, discussion, and development of joint action to secure change. Working at these levels the network has covered many areas which of which the following provides some snapshots.

#### Policy areas

**Agriculture** CAP reform and the Scottish Rural Development Programme continued to be the focus of the Agriculture task force whose vision for CAP's future is that it should focus on providing public goods, with a strong legislative baseline requiring the polluter to pay for environmental damage, and tiered support allowing all farmers to deliver environmental benefits and rewarding those most who provide highest benefits. The task force has produced a series of filenotes from December 2010 (<a href="http://www.scotlink.org/files/policy/PositionPapers/LINKPackbriefing1.pdf">http://www.scotlink.org/files/policy/PositionPapers/LINKPackbriefing1.pdf</a>) to expand on principles outlined in LINK's earlier *Beyond the CAP* publication; updates will follow as the process develops.

**Biodiversity** Throughout the year, the task force continued to contribute to all nine Scottish Biodiversity policy groups. The lack of leadership and progress made, in delivering the strategy, led the task force to reassess its deployment of resources. As a result, the task force agreed to withdraw from current groups, choosing instead to focus resources on key policy barriers that hinder member organisations in delivering biodiversity conservation on the ground. Despite this dispiriting process, the task force contributed to the development of ground-breaking provisions within the Wildlife and Natural Environment Act on the release and control of non-native invasive species in the wild.

**Climate Adaptation** In wake of the Scottish Climate Change legislation the focus of collective work through LINK has been on how to help wildlife adapt to impacts of climate change, guiding sectors of the economy to adapt to impacts of climate change in sustainable ways (with minimal impact on biodiversity and the natural environment) and identifying cross-over in advice on adaptation and mitigation and working to avoid confusion. The task force has pursued these in via consultation submissions, giving evidence, dialogue with Scottish Government and to some extent by integrating with parallel work by other LINK task forces.

Members' Congress 2010, framed as Environment and the Law, took a wide look at the parameters of law, from international treaties to citizens' access to justice, in relation to the environmental To ascertain whether the aspirations of Scotland's often world-leading concerns of the network. legislation have been realised, LINK commissioned review environmental (http://www.scotlink.org/files/publication/LINKReports/LINKEnvLawsRhetorictoReality.pdf). much to celebrate. Where reality falls short, the ninety members and guests taking part in Congress explored the extent and nature of the barriers to effective implementation, concluding that at root is a lack of follow-on scrutiny and a continuing misunderstanding of sustainable development. Despite growing awareness that the environment is the context for social and economic activity, this is strongly overridden by a 'business as usual' approach in Scotland and the environmental governance issues that flow from this will keep LINK busy for a while to come.

**Wildlife and Natural Environment Bill (WANE)** – A short-life group comprising representatives from LINK's Deer and Biodiversity task forces convened to influence the WANE Bill, succeeding in

improving the Bill as well as increasing LINK's standing with politicians and policy community. The new Act strengthens the biodiversity duty by adding a three-yearly reporting requirement as well as introducing the vicarious liability for wildlife crime. Scottish Government's U-turn between the original consultation and introducing the bill, on proposals for statutory sustainable deer management, was disappointing, though LINK members were pleased with a number of developments including: greater transparency on Control Orders so that it is now 'damage', not 'serious damage', that, when proven, should prompt reductions in numbers; and a change in the appeal system against Control Orders to use the Land Court rather than the Public Local Inquiry route, thus reducing scope for prevarication. Members will continue to press the case for statutory, sustainable deer management in the context of deliberations around the Deer Code.

**Freshwater** As part of members' ambition to see sustainable flood management underway and water quality in Scotland improving, the LINK task force responded to Government's Flood Risk Management consultation and to the Hydro Nation consultation on the future of Scottish water. They have also initiated contact with the Water Industry team at Scottish Government and look forward to developing dialogue. LINK and individual member organisations made submissions to the Better Regulation consultation by the Scottish Environment Protection Agency, constructively suggesting ways to improve our regulatory regimes and proposing equalisation of penalties for breaches with other parts of the UK. Work is now underway to consider the outcome of the consultation and the possibility of new legislation arising from it.

**LINK's Fundraisers' Forum** has met three times during the year and continued as a valued means of intelligence sharing for many members, on occasion inviting and exploring funding challenges with representatives of various funding sources.

Landscape Matters Scotland's Landscape Charter (<a href="http://www.snh.gov.uk/docs/B721956.pdf">http://www.snh.gov.uk/docs/B721956.pdf</a>) was finally launched by SNH in October 2010, but LINK landscape task force members remain concerned at the relatively narrow range of bodies which have signed up and at the lack of enthusiasm from the Scottish Government. The Scottish winner of the UK Landscape Award was announced in October 2010 and overall UK winders in November 2010; John Mayhew APRS, convenor of the LINK task force was on the Scottish judging panel. The UK Landscape Conference in November 2010 was attended by Helen McDade of JMT, a task force member. A joint letter promoting the European Landscape Convention was sent to the Prime Minister and the three First Ministers across the UK in January 2011, signed by six out of seven task force members and twenty-four other organisations

(http://www.ruralscotland.btik.com/Media/1061/What%20We%20Said/European%20Landscape%20Convention.pdf). All 40 National Scenic Areas were re-designated under the 2006 Planning Act and SNH published a comprehensive report on the Special Qualities of NSAs

(http://www.snh.gov.uk/docs/B695223.pdf). Task force members remain concerned over the impacts of the rapid expansion of onshore and offshore wind generation. Concerns over the review of permitted development were also highlighted, particularly in relation to upland vehicle tracks and archaeological deposits. Several members worked on wild land issues: JMT submitted a Parliamentary Petition calling for a new wild land designation; MCofS ran a campaign on hill tracks; and SWLG held a wild land conference. This task force held four meetings: in May, August and November 2010 and in February 2011 and these included discussions with Brenda Turvey and Simon Brooks of SNH on renewables and other landscape matters.

Marine recovery, from legislation to implementation Pursuing commitments in the Marine (Scotland) Act 2010, the task force has had detailed input this year to preliminary discussions and preconsultations on Scottish Marine Protected Area Guidelines, Marine Nature Conservation Strategy, identifying Priority Marine Features in Scottish waters, the new marine licensing system, the spatial plan for offshore wind development in Scottish territorial waters and the draft National Marine Plan, as

well as responding to a consultation on the boundaries for Scotland's Marine Regions. Two pieces of commissioned research informed the work, both the subject of well-received seminars held in Parliament. The first, *Avoiding Conflicts in the Marine Environment* 

(http://www.scotlink.org/files/publication/LINKReports/LINK ACME Report0610web.pdf), launched June 2010, supports the design and implementation of a regulatory framework that could secure both a thriving renewables industry and healthy seas. *Making the case for sound management of Marine Protected Areas* published March 2011, explores how recovery of the marine environment can be delivered in practice

(http://www.scotlink.org/files/publication/LINKReports/SAMSReportManagingMPAs full.pdf). For the Scottish parliamentary elections in May 2011 the task force will encourage candidate MSPs to show commitment to delivering healthy seas round Scotland by signing a marine declaration. Funding to support this invaluable marine work is provided to the Links across the UK by the Esmée Fairbairn Foundation and the Tubney Trust. In Scotland, this allows LINK to employ dedicated project staff with experience of marine policy and of advocacy.

**Planning** This LINK task force has maintained its watching brief on how Scotland's planning system impacts the environment and whether it meets Scotland's sustainability commitments. Work has included responses to consultations: on the Draft Order to Modify the Designation Order for the Cairngorms National Park, supporting the extension of the southern boundary into Perth and Kinross; on Resourcing a High Quality Planning System and on Amendments to the Modernised Planning System, underlining the need to retain high quality expertise, for the public to be able to participate, and for the importance of pre-application consultation; on The Environmental Impact Assessment (Scotland) Regulations 2010, broadly welcoming the proposals and suggesting some clarifications.

Scottish Environment Week 2011 Under the theme Active Citizens and the Scottish Environment the Week picked up on many examples of how NGOs and Government can rely on the active interest and effort of volunteers to work for the environment. Volunteering and building active citizenship has been a focus of successive Scottish administrations and the 2011 Week showed the Holyrood audience a wide diversity of natural and cultural heritage projects exploring their impact on individuals and communities. It framed environmental volunteering within the European Year of the Active Citizen and demonstrated connections through volunteering between the environmental, economic and social sectors. The Week also provided excellent networking and political opportunities in the run-up to the Scottish Parliamentary elections.

Local governance and environment LINK's Single Outcome Agreements task force continued its watchdog role around how national commitments for the environment and sustainable development are delivered by local government as part of the Concordat with local councils. This has led to closer working relations with various players in local government and the Improvement Service; also a clearer sense of the challenge for Community Planning Partnerships in engaging in the SOA process. A LINK-commissioned audit of Scotland's SOAs from CAG consultants, published early 2011 (<a href="http://www.scotlink.org/files/publication/LINKReports/LINKsoaReportAudit2011.pdf">http://www.scotlink.org/files/publication/LINKReports/LINKsoaReportAudit2011.pdf</a>), formed the basis of a seminar jointly hosted by LINK, SNH, SEPA, SDC Scotland, Sustainable Scotland Network, the Improvement Service and Scottish Government, held at COSLA's Edinburgh offices. The event, attended by over two thirds of Scotland's Councils, explored the SOA process noting changes that

would be needed to ensure this ambitious and complex process can deliver in our communities. LINK will pursue outcomes in dialogue with national and local government, developing priorities for the 2012 Local Council elections and hopes to continue to develop synergy with Scotland's local councils.

**Sustainable land use** Still pursuing what was a LINK-generated legislative achievement secured during negotiation of Scotland's Climate Change Act, this task force has worked to keep the merits of the strategy high on the policy agenda, to secure interpretation of the term as planning for the

sustainable use of all land and resources (excluding marine) and to promote the benefits this can bring for the Scottish economy and society as well as our environment. Using its 2009 report, *Living with the Land*, as the basis for advocacy, LINK pursued dialogue with Government, helped shape, then responded to, public consultation and subsequently hosted a national conference in November 2010 to consider the Government's draft. The initiative succeeded in ensuring that Holyrood's RAE Committee called in the draft for the earliest example on Scottish record of post-legislative scrutiny; however, Government remains surprisingly resistant to acknowledging the place of land use in the policy hierarchy and to a stakeholder forum to pursue implementation of their strategy.

Work with other Networks LINK has played an active part in the Scottish Council for Voluntary Organisations through membership of its Policy Committee, and has made some progress in raising environmental concerns up the civic agenda. Our supportive role for Stop Climate Chaos Scotland has widened our exposure to other parts of the Scottish policy community and been of major importance in the fight against climate change. Dialogue has continued with the Built Environment Forum Scotland and the Civic Trust - important allied organisations within the policy community. All of this has helped raise the profile of LINK as a serious player in the life of the Scottish civic and policy community. The Link networks in Scotland, England, Northern Ireland and Wales have liaised over the year, exchanging experience and approaches on policy, governance and funding. WWF UK's valued support for Links liaison in 2010 was spent largely on coordinating a Joint Links Seminar in Chester in September. Over 40 delegates from the four Links convened at Chester University campus to consider the new UK government, changing political landscapes and effects of recession. This was also an opportunity for task forces and working groups in the Links to share experience and identify topics for future joint work. Delegates heard an excellent presentation on Roman Chester (thanks to Dr John Doran) and took part in site visits to Ashton Hayes & Blacon carbon neutral projects (thanks to Prof Roy Alexander) and wildlife sites on the Dee Estuary (thanks to Colin Wells and RSPB).

#### **Broader policy effort**

**Environment and budget cuts** Addressing the economic situation, in November 2010 LINK submitted a paper to the Scottish Government giving a realistic assessment of the known cuts in budgets and stressing the need to protect environment spending within the context of its long term implications and ways in which it would be disproportionately affected by any 'salami slicing' approach to budget cuts. The paper was discussed with Ministers and LINK's first foray into budgetary discussions was well received.

**Future public service delivery** LINK also made written and verbal submissions to the Christie Commission on the future of Public Service Delivery, again making the case that quality of our environment is fundamental to the long-term 'preventive' approach which will allow reductions in remedial public service provision. LINK made a strong case to the Commission (which will report in July 2011) that the definition of public services must not be restricted to narrow social service provision but seen also in the broad sense that all policy delivery, including environmental regulation and incentives, should be considered in the public interest as a public service.

Manifestos and the Scottish parliamentary elections In this final year of the SNP minority Parliament in Scotland members focussed on manifesto asks of the parties and candidates in the leadup to the Scottish parliamentary elections set for 5 May 2011. LINK decided to establish a 'rolling manifesto' for the network setting key issues in the context of sustainable development and clarifying 'asks' of governments at the local, national Scottish, UK and European levels. The manifesto (http://www.scotlink.org/public/policy/Manifesto.php) covers 36 sub-sections under headings of climate, education, health and wellbeing, communities, crime and policing, economy, energy, transport, sustainable land use, sustainable marine strategy, biodiversity, and justice and governance. The groundwork is an important foundation for continuing manifesto updates that LINK will carry out in advance of the 2012 Local Government and future national and international elections. Taken in conjunction with the effort of members, the awareness of Scotland's politicians around the importance of environment and the extent of voter concerns is growing despite the pressures of the continued economic downturn. Important gains over the next five years, in several policy areas, may follow as a result of this work. LINK has also engaged in the political party conferences playing an observational role as the election approaches. In advance of the election LINK plans to assist SCCS and others in holding candidates to account at hustings, asking candidates to sign up to commitments on wildlife protection and enhancing the marine environment.

**Environmental justice** LINK has continued to carry a watching brief on access to justice. Members working on proposals for a coal-fired power station at Hunterston succeeded in obtaining a Protective Cost Order from the Court of Session hearing a judicial review of the application. This major step forward is being followed through with construction of a case for the full and proper implementation of the Aarhus Convention on Environmental Justice by the Scottish Government and courts.

#### **Governance and Administration**

**Network meetings, developing strategy** LINK's AGM in June passed changes to constitutional arrangements for supporters of LINK and for Board tenure and welcomed Helen Todd as a new trustee. Helen is Development Officer with Ramblers Scotland. The chair passed to Deborah Long from Ian McCall, whose involvement in LINK dated to 1992; he had served on the Board for a number of years including from 2009 to 2010 as Chair and had been involved through RSPB and Ramblers Scotland in a wide range of LINK initiatives. Deborah Long is Scottish Conservation Manager for the UK charity, Plantlife, and has been active on LINK Board for a number of years. LINK's outgoing Treasurer, David Downie, had served on the Board for eight years; David was also involved in several of its sub groups provided line management support to LINK's Chief Officer for four years. This passed to the new Chair in July 2010.

Collective work priorities were reviewed at LINK network meetings in April, June, November and January. These meetings also serve to ensure necessary integration between different areas of work and as opportunities to evaluate outcomes of particular areas of work and share lessons among the network. Discussion is informed by a political strategy report produced twice-yearly on political, judicial and administrative contexts by the Parliamentary Officer, which flags issues and opportunities and prompts decisions on new directions.

Amongst areas highlighted at the annual planning session (November) were: building the case for the economics of sustainable development; the need for scrutiny of legislation; a wider role regarding environmental governance in Scotland's local communities; continued effort to promote sustainable land use strategy; and monitoring how the Planning Act is delivering and what it is costing Scotland. Environmental governance has progressed up LINK's agenda as a result of this process, as perceived shortcomings in the legislative, executive, judicial and civic processes have increasingly been identified as significant barriers in our pursuit of the achievement of sustainable development. LINK will consider how to take this agenda forward with others in civic Scotland in spring 2011.

**Board priorities** The Board of trustees, which met in April, June, October and January, has prioritised funding over the year, setting up a 'response team' to review funding scenarios that inform our financial planning and to support staff in scoping possible new funding channels suitable for the role of an intermediary, or forum. The work is on-going — our network role not being one which instantly attracts support — and we will sustain investment in this at trustee and staff level in the year ahead. From autumn 2010 a Board search-group has reviewed the remit for LINK's presidential role and begun a search for an individual to succeed Dr Helen Zealley as LINK President from autumn 2011. Succession planning for other office bearers also began in March 2011.

A parallel priority for trustees has been dialogue with various NDPBs to exchange thinking on environment and sustainable development and build mutual understanding of respective roles. Constructive and useful meetings have been held with trustees and senior staff of Scottish Natural Heritage and Scottish Environment Protection Agency and strategic discussion is planned with the board of Cairngorms National Park Authority ahead of publication of its new park plan. LINK's various task forces are regularly in contact with counterparts in various agencies, and in Scottish Government, Marine Scotland and Forestry Commission Scotland.

Support with the establishment and early development of the new Fred Edwards Trust has continued over 2010/11. LINK was among those involved in the early scoping of an initiative to promote principles espoused by Fred Edwards in Scottish public life and practice. LINK has continued to provide support by providing the company secretary role, coordinating the launch of the Trust in October 2010 jointly with the University of Edinburgh, and supporting development of the action learning programme up till January 2011.

**Carbon accounts** LINK has published its third detailed annual report on Carbon Emissions resulting from LINK business activities during the financial year. It can be read in full or downloaded from our website at <a href="http://www.scotlink.org/public/itemlisting.php?id=605">http://www.scotlink.org/public/itemlisting.php?id=605</a>. This year we have extended our reporting to include new measures of emissions per employee and have benchmarked our Perth office emissions against typical and good practice equivalents using the Carbon Trust's benchmarking tool. LINK also plans to set up a virtual carbon forum for members to keep in touch and share good practice and intelligence about carbon accounting and reporting. We have continued to share thinking with SCVO on this.

**Staffing** Lindsay Roberts joined LINK's staff In June 2010 as Marine Policy Advocacy Officer working alongside Alan Wells, though from a base at RSPB Scotland in Edinburgh, and supporting the marine task force. Lindsay brought useful experience of marine policy and parliamentary process from previous employment with the Scottish Green Party. Alan Wells left LINK in December 2010 to take up a post with the Association of Salmon Fishery Boards after over three years' excellent support for the task force as marine project officer, spanning the passage of Scottish legislation and the start of the implementation phase. Sarah Archer, whose previous experience with Defra was in marine biodiversity, was appointed from January 2011, working from WWF Scotland's office in Dunkeld. Susan Guest left LINK in March 2011, after four years' much-valued support as LINK's Parliamentary Administration Officer in Edinburgh. Susan provided continuity during transition between three different Parliamentary Officers (including a maternity leave and a changeover of staff), was responsible for parliamentary monitoring, coordinating parliamentary events, supporting LINK's webwork as well as a range of other administration. She has moved on for a job in the north of England and later, to travel.

**Membership** Despite a financial climate which puts a strain on all organisations and could spell difficulties for network organisations, membership of LINK has remained very steady over the reporting year. In July 2010, Scottish Badgers joined LINK. LINK regrets the loss of the Royal Zoological Society of Scotland and members very much hope the Society will be able to re-join the network in future. Membership stood at 34 organisations as the reporting year ended in March.

**Trial affiliation for wider environmental organisations** From summer 2010 LINK has been piloting an Organisational Supporter affiliation which offers benefits to organisations with environmental interests and agendas, whose status renders them ineligible for membership but which may share interests in common with the network. The affiliation confers many, not all, benefits of membership and allows parts of the wider sector that are not primarily citizen-led to support the role that LINK plays in bringing bodies together and promoting the environmental case to decision makers. The trial will be reviewed at summer 2011.

## Board Members' Report and Accounts for the year ended 31 March 2011

#### Plans and activity for 2011/12

**Financial scrutiny** 

The Board will continue to focus on sustaining key services with potentially diminished core funding. The importance of our independence as a collective voice for the eNGOs is fundamental. This will require greater investment in testing new or different funding channels and correspondingly less time for other support to the network. A tighter operating budget and uncertainties about core funding beyond March 2012 are leading to caution in terms of new commitments and investments. Our discretionary project fund is likely to be modest; over the last ten years this has allowed the Board to support useful research and publications and a number of seminars involving LINK and other stakeholders. It allows LINK to support key network priorities where resources in member bodies are scarcer. Examples over the last few years have been our very well regarded work on Single Outcome Agreements, Sustainable Land Use, and more internally focussed guidance on Carbon Accounting, and training in Fundraising.

#### Forward strategy

Informing our funding focus as well as our mission for the next few years, the Board will initiate a strategic review in summer 2011 to check members' satisfaction with LINK and the service they receive and confirm their essential expectations going forward. This will be complemented by an independent assessment commissioned by the Board to measure LINK's wider impact and influence. The Board aims to consult members and take informal soundings from representatives of other sectors on a draft strategic plan for 2012/15 by winter 2011. Following Board review of the trial of our Organisational Supporter category of affiliation, there will be discussion with the membership around whether and how to expand the affiliation. In the same way that the network has worked with Stop Climate Chaos Scotland (SCCS), through active contributions and non-duplication, we will continue to work with SCCS and other progressive alliances on areas joint interest. Network planning at autumn 2010 informed development of the Operating Plan for 2011/12. Most of LINK's existing task forces have active plans for the year ahead. For new areas of work staff and trustees will set up initial scoping discussions: a workshop on the economics of the ecosystem and biodiversity is planned for summer 2011 and LINK will also review how best to contribute to the debate on 'GDP and beyond' following publication of the Carnegie Commission report in spring 2011. LINK's existing task force on Single Outcome Agreements will widen its scope in the coming year. Advocacy training will be offered to members once again during summer 2011; a carbon accounting workshop for members to share good practice will be organised for autumn 2011. With the Local Government elections coming up in spring 2012 a significant area of work for members will be refreshing LINK's manifesto asks of the parties both at national and local level and this will be coordinated over the summer of 2011.

#### Succession planning for President

The Board will be involved too in identifying and inducting a new President, confirming needs in relation to Board succession for the next few years and recruiting against these for the AGM planned for 30 August 2011.

#### IT

LINK staff will review IT support needs and scope the market during summer 2011 with a view to upgrading IT provision by October 2011. A watching brief on communications and IT needs is also being kept – in particular on the extent to which the network could develop use of video-conference to save time, money and emissions in meeting together.

#### Financial review

**Treasuring** In June 2010, LINK welcomed Paul Ritchie, Director of Finance and Resources at the Scottish Wildlife Trust, to the role of Treasurer. Paul has taken the opportunity to get to familiarise himself with financial work and with the network, over the last nine months. Paul took over from David Downie, Treasurer for the previous eight years and LINK is pleased to record our thanks to David for his work for LINK over this period. He was instrumental in founding the Board's funding subgroup, helping to develop financial systems and to move LINK to its current funding philosophy, key to the network's relative financial health now. In addition David led the employment subgroup addressing a range of recruitment and HR issues and providing line management support to the Chief Officer over a period of four years.

**Funds overview and reserves** LINK closed the financial year with £158,328 in unrestricted funds, of which £6,607 represented fixed assets and £5,855 was designated funding carried forward for active projects (detailed in Note 19). We also carried forward £33,879 of restricted funding for the on-going marine project. The Board agreed to maintain within the unrestricted balance a figure of £91,000 for contingency issues, including three months' core operating costs, core staff commitment to projects and potential redundancies, in the event that the company has to be wound up. The figure also includes sufficient funds to allow LINK to respond in the short term to any relatively sudden withdrawal of support from a major funder or some of our members. The policy is kept under review each year. The resulting balance of £54,865 in available unrestricted funds is largely as anticipated.

**Income streams** LINK income overall was approximately £68,000 higher than last year: unrestricted income was around £21,000 higher and restricted income was around £47,000 higher. The increase in unrestricted income mostly results from new core funding from Craignish Trust, increased SNH funding for 2010-11, new income from meeting room rental and hosting an employee from Community Energy Scotland in our Perth office, and from increased cost recovery of salaries and overheads for externally-funded projects. Restricted income this year included increased funding for our marine project from the Esmée Fairbairn Foundation and the Tubney Trust, and a higher level of other sponsored project activities. To support members through this difficult period, LINK froze membership subscription rates for the second year running. As a membership organisation, members and Board set a goal in 2004 of raising at least 50% of essential costs through internal membership subscriptions by 2011, in order to reduce reliance on external funding and demonstrate member bodies' commitment to the network. We exceeded this target for the first time in 2009/10, although this year's subscription income was lower than expected due to the sudden resignation of one of our Band 1 member organisations which was experiencing financial difficulties. The total membership income of £70,408 represented 49% of our essential expenditure during the year.

**Acknowledgements** LINK's other principal income streams were grants from Scottish Natural Heritage, Scottish Government and the Esmée Fairbairn Foundation, whose support the network is very pleased to acknowledge. These channels are vital our work. LINK would also like to acknowledge the valued contributions received towards its work this year, from:

- Historic Scotland, Scottish Council for Voluntary Organisations, Calor Scotland, the Cairngorms and Loch Lomond and Trossachs National Park Authorities - all of which helped to sponsor Scottish Environment Week 2011 in March;
- SEPA for its support towards the Seminar on Single Outcome Agreements held in February;
- WWF-UK grant support towards Joint Links liaison during 2010;
- Capability Scotland towards the costs of establishing the Fred Edwards Trust: and
- continuing grant support from the Esmée Fairbairn Foundation and the Tubney Trust for the marine project, which is very welcome.

**Expenditure** LINK expenditure overall was £63,000 higher than last year: a £56,000 increase in project expenditure, and a £7,000 increase in core expenditure. While core staff employment costs rose by £7,000 compared with last year, half of this increase was due to additional staff hours designated by the Board in support of the Fred Edwards project. The Board increased staff salaries by an average of 2.6%. All other areas of core unrestricted expenditure, such as establishment and other direct costs, were kept under tight control throughout the year, resulting in no overall increase in expenditure of year on year. As well as the project to establish a new charity in memory of our previous president Fred Edwards, LINK designated funds from its discretionary project fund during the year to commission a report on the implementation of key environmental legislation in Scotland since devolution, to contribute to costs of the Single Outcome Agreement audit, to allow members to take legal advice during the process of the WANE Bill through Holyrood, and for development of the Scottish Wildlife Proclamation.

Financial outlook LINK starts the new financial year with a prudent level of core / unrestricted reserves, but significant funding uncertainty with regard to the future of the Esmée Fairbairn Foundation core grant. Grant funding by Scottish Government and Scottish Natural Heritage has been confirmed for the coming financial year (2011/12); LINK is still discussion with the Esmée Fairbairn Foundation. The Board has decided to designate a much smaller level of unrestricted funds (£5,000) to the annual Discretionary project fund, until this issue is resolved. Trustees have been aware for some time that the coming years may be tougher, with both government and private grantors indicating uncertainties around NGO funding in general, and LINK has consciously built up a contingency reserve which should allow reaction time to manage impacts. A conservative forward budget has been set which would result in a small deficit for financial year 2011-12, though that deficit could increase if our efforts to renew Esmée Fairbairn Foundation or replace the funding with alternatives do not succeed. A Board response team under our Vice Chair has been meeting regularly to review the situation and will review our funding philosophy, our service deliverables to the membership and their associated costs, in case a reduction in core expenditure becomes essential to balance our budget in future. The forward budget includes a proposal to increase membership subscriptions by 1%, which has been communicated to members. Depending on core support factors outlined above, LINK may have to review this increase, at the same time striving to maximise the number of members active in our network. LINK is committed to maintaining its independence from government or any other non-NGO sector grantors. LINK is moving into the second of the three-year extension to the marine project funded in all four countries by the Esmée Fairbairn Foundation and the Tubney Trust. This represents significant funding support which hugely helps the networks' effort to secure sound implementation phase of legislative commitments in the UK Marine and Coastal Access Act (2009) and the Marine (Scotland) Act 2010.


The Board members' have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

**Scrutiny** The Company's financial management is based on careful planning, regular monitoring and reporting, and considered decision-making. The Board approves the annual budget every January and trustees receive reports on financial activity each quarter to determine whether action is needed to address variance between budgeted and actual expenditure. The Funding subgroup of the Board meets regularly and is responsible for recommending any additional Discretionary spend to the full Board over the budget year, as well as monitoring income and expenditure generally.

**Voluntary engagement** Voluntary investment and engagement by member organisations in LINK activity is central to the contribution LINK makes as a collective. Over and above their subscriptions, the thirty five member bodies invest staff-time and more in LINK activities and management and in representing LINK in wider stakeholder processes. A number of them also support network activity in

kind, providing meeting rooms, printing and other facilities, lending technical equipment and support, and sharing organisational policies and templates. The support of Honorary Fellows and President for LINK's work is an important part of this picture. During this last financial year, LINK conservatively estimates that over 1,100 person-days of voluntary investment were received for LINK collective activities, which represents a real value of almost £250,000. The graph below shows this contribution against our income streams.



#### **Auditors**

LINK's trustees confirm there is no information of which they are aware which is relevant to the audit, but of which the auditor is unaware. They have also indicated that they have taken appropriate steps to identify such relevant information and to establish that the auditors are aware of such information.

In accordance with section 487(2) of the Companies Act 2006, a resolution proposing that Morris & Young be re-appointed as auditors of the company will be put to the Annual General Meeting.

#### 1 Accounting policies

#### **Basis of preparation**

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2005)', issued in March 2005, the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008) and the Companies Act 2006.

#### **Fund accounting policy**

Unrestricted income funds are general funds that are available for use at the trustees' discretion in furtherance of the objectives of the charity.

Restricted funds are those donated for use in a particular area or for specific purposes, the use of which is restricted to that area or purpose.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds set aside at the discretion of the trustees for specific purposes.

Further details of each fund are disclosed in note 20.

#### **Incoming resources**

Voluntary income including donations and grants that provide core funding or are of a general nature is recognised where there is entitlement, certainty of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Investment income is recognised on a receivable basis.

Income from charitable activities includes income recognised as earned (as the related goods or services are provided) under contract or where entitlement to grant funding is subject to specific performance conditions. Grant income included in this category provides funding to support programme activities and is recognised where there is entitlement, certainty of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability.

#### Resources expended

Liabilities are recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to the expenditure. All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category.

Costs of generating funds are the costs associated with attracting voluntary income.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

#### **Governance costs**

Governance costs include costs of the preparation and examination of the statutory accounts, the costs of trustee meetings and the cost of any legal advice to trustees on governance or constitutional matters.

#### **Fixed assets**

Individual fixed assets costing £250 or more are initially recorded at cost.

#### Depreciation

Depreciation is provided on tangible fixed assets so as to write off the cost or valuation, less any estimated residual value, over their expected useful economic life as follows:

Fixtures and fittings

33% straight line basis

#### **Operating leases**

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged in the statement of financial activities on a straight line basis over the lease term.

#### Pensions

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions are charged in the statement of financial activities as they become payable in accordance with the rules of the scheme.
