Westminster Elections

1. Hustings

Election time is when the public get their say. If the public say the environment is important to them, politicians will listen.

We know that the UK General election will take place in spring 2010 (most likely date is Thursday 6th May). Due to possible swings in the vote and many MPs resigning, this election is also likely to return a high percentage of new MPs. Now is a great time to remind them that the environment matters to their constituents. It's also worth noting that Many PPCs will resurface at Holyrood, European and Local elections, by maintaining our engagement with these politicians we reinforce our reputations at all levels of politics.

Working together across Scotland, LINK member organisations can provide a focus for debate, by organising a Hustings event. These meetings allow constituents to ask their candidates what the environment means to them. For the host organisation you have the opportunity to introduce prospective candidates to your organisation and the wider LINK network.

Sounds Daunting? Don't worry, LINK have put together a <u>Hustings pack</u> which includes a step by step guide to organising a hustings. The pack also contains sample letters, and press releases.

Avoid Clashes, Stay in the loop - LINK have also created a <u>calendar</u> of all the confirmed hustings, to help you avoid clashes. Remember to let us know about your event so we can add!

2. Manifesto

Andy Myles is coordinating production text for the LINK manifesto for both the UK and the Scottish (2011) elections.

Single Outcome Agreement: LINK's Working for Sustainable Development through Single Outcome agreements was published on 11th February and distributed to local authority Chief Executives, COSLA, Improvement Service, Audit Scotland and other stakeholders. RAFTS are holding their annual conference on 10th March at the Battleby Institute, Redgorton, near Perth. The conference theme is *"Agreeing to disagree: Dealing with thorny issues"*. Who Benefits from GM Crops? A new report from **Friends of the Earth** exposes that GM crops are failing to feed the world or tackle climate change. Globally GM crops remain confined to less than 3% of agricultural land and more than 99% are grown for animal feed and agrofuels, rather than food. There is still not a single commercial GM crop with increased yield, drought-tolerance, salt-tolerance, enhanced nutrition or other beneficial traits long promised by biotech companies. CALLS FOR ACTION

Scottish Government Land Use Strategy discussion workshops: promote LINK's position on Sustainable Land Use Strategy at <u>Scottish Government discussion workshops</u>, <u>15-31 March</u>. LINK's <u>Living with the Land</u> is a major contribution to the strategy which became a requirement in the Climate Change Act. Insect Pollination- PostNote from the Parliamentary Office on Science and Technology. Estimates that the contribution of insect pollination (primarily bees) is worth £440m, 13% of UK income from farming. Similar hand pollination would cost an estimated £1.5bn. As honey bees provide only 10% of pollination, there needs to be greater emphasis on studying wild pollinators. Link

Sustainable Development Commission Scotland's Third Annual Assessment: Review of Scottish Government actions on sustainable development from autumn 2008 to autumn 2009. The assessment analyses central policy areas based on Government's own indicators and recommends action. *"Frameworks in place but lack of follow-through to the local level"* Download

Extending Permitted Development Rights for Domestic Micro-Wind Turbines and Air-Source Heat Pumps (SG 05/02/10)

On 15 January 2010 Scottish Ministers consulted on draft proposals to extend permitted development rights to micro wind turbines and air source heat pump installation on domestic buildings and laid an Order in the Scottish Parliament on 5 February giving effect to an amendment of the GDPO. Scottish Ministers are now able to take forward a consultation on much more wide-ranging proposals for the extension of permitted development rights to MWT and ASHP. These proposals are based on research 1 for the Scottish Government, which was published in December 2009. Consultation period 05/02/10 - 30/04/10. Link
