LINK NEWS

LINK's latest report, <u>Scotland's Environmental Laws since Devolution - From Rhetoric to Reality</u>, was launched at LINK's Festive reception on 16th December. The review of key environmental legislation in Scotland since devolution prepared by Tamsin Bailey, assesses the success of eight key environmental laws from the last ten years, which LINK and its members bodies campaigned for in working to protect Scotland's environment.

LINK's **Agriculture Taskforce** has produced a <u>file note</u> on the Pack report on the future of agricultural support in Scotland. This is the first in a series of briefings from Scotlish Environment LINK designed to encourage debate on topics relating to land use in Scotland.

LINK's **Sustainable Land Use Taskforce** has submitted its response to the Scottish Government's draft land use strategy. Read the submission here. Vicky Swales the SLUS Taskforce's Convenor also gave evidence to the RAE Committee in December on the strategy.

TAKE ACTION: Support WWF's e-action on the RPP debate – next Wednesday 12th January the Scottish Parliament will be debating the Report on Policies and Proposals which sets out how Scotland will meet its climate change targets. With the most ambitious climate change legislation in the world, it is crucial that Scotland keeps walking the talk when it comes to reducing greenhouse gas emissions, leading the way towards a better future for people and wildlife. You have a great chance right now to stop our Climate Change Act from falling at the first hurdle. Please ask your MSP to do all they can to strengthen key areas - particularly in transport and energy efficiency. Visit WFF's e-action page.

After eight years as Chief Executive of **Friends of the Earth Scotland**, Duncan McLaren is stepping down in March. He and his family will be moving to Sweden, his partner's home country.

Friends of the Earth Scotland's latest report <u>42% Better</u>, states that meeting Scotland's target of a 42% reduction in greenhouse gas emissions by 2020 could increase employment, cut health-care costs and reduce social exclusion. The report finds for example, that investments in energy efficiency typically reduce future energy costs and more than repay the initial investment. Other benefits accrue both directly to individuals and more widely to society as a whole such as improved health, reduced congestion, improved comfort, and significant reductions in the incidence of fuel poverty.

SDC Scotland's Fourth Annual Assessment warns that the Government is putting Scotland's long term prosperity at serious risk by failing to make the hard choices for a sustainable economy. The Commission welcomes the good work on renewables but warns that it has failed to signal the move away from dependence on oil and gas which is crucial to future-proof Scotland's economy. SNH Commissioned Report 382: Involving people in biological recording - This research addressed "how best to increase the numbers and range of people and organisations involved in voluntary biological recording, and to increase the total pool of available skills and knowledge". Key findings include: data quality is generally high but there are insufficient experienced recorders, particularly in some regions, to meet the demand; attracting people to biological recording is fairly straightforward but requires clear and simple ways to get involved and the support of experienced people to train, direct and motivate volunteers; and, new technologies





have the potential to play a critical role in supporting voluntary effort through better data management, help with identification, and improved communication. Download here

Securing the Benefits of Scotland's Next Energy Revolution - Scottish government consultation on proposals to ensure Scotland and its local communities benefit from renewable and low carbon energy developments. Adapting to the Changing Climate: Consultation on the Environmental Impacts of Adaptation - This is the SEA Environmental Report on the draft Sector Action Plans, which sit beneath the Climate Change Adaptation Framework. Details here. Scottish government consultation open until 7th February 2011.

Consultation on the Inventory of Scottish Battlefields - Historic Scotland is preparing an inventory identifying Scotland's nationally important battlefields to ensure that they are looked after now and for future generations. The Inventory of Historic Battlefields is being delivered in two stages, the first by March 2011, the second by March 2012 and Historic Scotland is currently consulting on the first stage of the inventory. The consultation is open until 11 February 2011. More details here

Pollution Prevention and Control (Scotland) Regulations 2010: Proposals to Introduce Standard Rules - Scottish Government consultation to introduce provisions into the PPC regulatory regime to enable the Scottish Environment Protection Agency to take a take a more risk-based and proportionate approach to regulation across a range of lower risk activities, consistent with the need to protect human health and the environment. £10.3m Climate Challenge Fund is now accepting new bids - application forms for the one year grant scheme from the Scottish Government which supports communities to tackle climate change by reducing their carbon emissions available at the Keep Scotland Beautiful website. Following the Scottish government's announcement to cease funding SDC Scotland, the future operation of the Climate Challenge Fund Supporting Alliance (of which LINK is a member) which provides networking and support functions for the fund remains unclear. The Alliance will however continue operating out of SDC Scotland for a short while, with transfer of functions to other organisations to be announced in due course.
