SCOTTISH GOVERNMENT CONSULTATION ON THE GENERAL PERMITTED DEVELOPMENT **ORDER 2012**

Scottish Environment LINK is the forum for Scotland's voluntary environment organisations, with over 30 member bodies representing a broad spectrum of environmental interests with the common goal of contributing to a more environmentally sustainable society. We welcome this opportunity to comment on the above consultation.

As permitted development rights (PDR) remove the requirement for planning consent from a planning authority, in most cases they remove any opportunity for third parties to comment on proposals or for the planning authority or third parties to influence the design of development proposals. It is therefore critical that PDR are not expanded to include any activities where there is a risk of environmental harm.

Scottish Environment LINK particularly welcomes the proposal to amend classes 18, 22 and 27 to ensure that the formation or alteration of new access tracks would require the submission of a planning application. The restriction on maintenance to prevent a material change to tracks is also welcome and is necessary to ensure that narrow or ill-defined tracks are not upgraded as a means of circumventing the intention of legislation. It is assumed that the word 'alteration' under classes 18 and 22 will be removed, although this is not stated explicitly in the consultation.

We also believe that class 19, minerals working for agriculture, should be removed to ensure that this activity also receives the full scrutiny of the planning consent process.

We are disappointed that PDR under Class 20 (land drainage works) have not been removed. Land drainage has the potential to impact on natural and cultural heritage interests, including important carbon stores such as peatlands, potentially affect water quality, and to exacerbate flooding. All new or significantly upgraded drainage works should require planning permission. For the same reasons, and to ensure consistency, similar amendments should be made to class 18A(1), irrigation or drainage for agriculture.



I hope these comments are of assistance in finalising Scottish Government's proposals for an amended GPDO, however please do not hesitate to contact me should you wish to discuss any matters further.
