Scotland's seas are in urgent need of legislation that will protect our marine environment and its resources, now and in the future.

In his announcement on a Scottish Marine Bill in June 2007, Richard Lochhead, Cabinet Secretary for Rural Affairs and the Environment, promised a Bill that would deliver a simpler regulatory system for the marine environment, more action on marine nature conservation, a strategic national approach and greater local control over marine and coastal areas.

Scottish Environment LINK is campaigning for a Scottish Marine Bill that would ensure all of the above *and* place nature conservation at the very heart of the Bill.

We urge the government to introduce a Scottish Marine Bill that includes:

- Better protection for Scotland's marine wildlife, including identification, protection and management of nationally important marine areas
- An effective new planning system for Scotland's seas
- A Marine Management Organisation to take charge of planning, licensing and enforcement at sea
- Clear targets to measure the recovery of our seas

It is vital that the Scottish Government works closely with the UK Government to ensure that a Scottish Marine Bill for Scottish waters complements the UK Marine Bill, delivering overarching policy.

Better protection for Scotland's wildlife

Species protection

To ensure the protection of marine wildlife from 12 to 200 nautical miles, much of which is currently unprotected. This may include an amendment of the Wildlife and Countryside Act, including addition of new species

Site protection

A network of marine protected areas including urgently needed Nationally Important Marine Areas (NIMAs) for sites with particular importance to Scotland

- To help prevent the continued loss of wildlife
- To ensure that Scotland meets its international commitments of an 'ecologically coherent network of well managed marine protected areas' by 2010

Public Policy

Wider policy measures and plans, including marine planning, should be underpinned by the importance of and potential impact on marine biodiversity

Marine Management Organisation

In charge of planning, licensing and enforcement at sea

- A national decision-making body overseeing planning of devolved activities in Scottish waters
- Central point of expertise, responsible to Scottish ministers

Scottish Environment LINK is the umbrella body for Scotland's voluntary environmental organisations, representing around 500.000

- Adjusting the marine strategy according to how well objectives have been met
- Making sure that planning management decisions do not adversely affect the function and productivity of the marine ecosystem
