ABOLITION OF BRIDGE TOLLS (SCOTLAND) BILL

While we oppose the Government's Bill to abolish tolls on the Forth and Tay bridges, we do understand that you have a manifesto commitment to deliver this.

However, we were very concerned by your comment in the stage one debate on the Bill on 15 November that you are 'minded to accept' a Conservative amendment which would remove the power of bridge authorities to introduce road user charging on any bridge in Scotland. We consider this would be an enormously retrograde step, and we are writing to urge the Government not to support such an amendment at stage three. We have supported your proposals for an 80% reduction in greenhouse gas emissions and feel such an amendment would significantly limit your options for delivering this target.

Such an amendment would not only remove the possibility of introducing road user charging on Scotland's bridges, it would also require additional primary legislation to introduce nation-wide road user charging, as recommended by the Eddington review. The benefits of road user charging in contributing to Government economic and environment policy goals are significant. We also question how your ambitious climate change targets can be achieved without road user charging.

I hope you can assure me that the Government will not support the Conservative amendment to the Bill. I look forward to hearing from you.
