Structure and governance

Purposes and strategic objectives

LINK is a Scottish charity and a Company limited by guarantee since its incorporation in 2003. In the event of the Company's being dissolved its members would each be required to contribute up to £1. Founded in 1987 LINK provides a forum for its member organisations, all voluntary sector environmental bodies with a base in and operating across Scotland, supporting them in exchanging information, developing common positions and taking joint action where there are issues of common concern. LINK is governed by its Memorandum and Articles (last amended in 2006) and in day-to-day operations its member organisations follow the *modus operandi* laid down in its set of operating principles.

LINK's charitable purposes are concerned with advancing conservation and enhancement of Scotland's natural and associated cultural heritage, encouraging awareness and understanding of the role of the environment in the wider context of sustainable development, and promoting effectiveness and efficiency among the voluntary environmental sector. In terms of public benefit, it is in the wider public interest that we have a healthy environment within which to live and develop. LINK's projects and its policy advocacy all profile and promote the importance of a healthy environment for people's wellbeing, for communities and visitors, and for the livelihoods of current and future generations. LINK's purposes are reflected in the network's strategic objectives, ie: to work towards a sustainable Scotland where national decision-making takes account of the needs of society, economy and the environment; to be a strong voice for the environment in public and policy debate; and to function as an efficient, effective and accountable network.

The Trustees confirm they have complied with section 4 of the Charities Act 2006 having given due attention to the guidance in relation to public benefit.

Membership, member engagement, wider affiliation

Over the reporting period LINK has delivered well against these, as this report illustrates, despite impacts of recession on our own and our members' operations and a significant reduction in the corporate and public sectors' ability to support environmental activity.

Membership increased (see full list at http://www.scotlink.org/public/about/members.php) and member feedback confirms that LINK delivers important value for money to both its smaller and larger environmental member bodies. LINK member organisations continue with over 500,000 individual members between them. Reception of LINK's policy contributions and reaction to its initiatives continue to demonstrate that the network's expertise and evidence-based proposals are valued by decision-makers.

Given the democracy underpinning LINK's structure, forward strategy is set by members, together assessing critical trends and key issues for joint action and identifying where engaging through LINK is likely to add value to, and complement, individual members' action. The percentage of member body involvement in the Board, task forces and other joint work was over 94% with 'low activity' noted in relation to just two of the smaller organizations.

The Board has taken time to assess its relationship with the wider environmental network including non-member NGOs, government agencies, green business and environmental

consultancies. Many of these have become a part of LINK's information sharing network, share extensively in LINK discussions of policy and are linked to LINK in taking joint action on a wide range of issues. To formalize the relationship LINK has developed proposals for a new package of affiliation, which will be launched in autumn 2010.

The work programme

The programme for member activity through LINK for 2009/10 was agreed in autumn 2008, set out in the network's operating plan for 09/10 and taken forward through network task forces, by Board and staff. Discussion by the network at autumn 2009 confirmed economics & environment, local authority delivery of environmental objectives, UK elections, climate, land use and biodiversity as priorities agreeing that whilst LINK should be alert to gaps in the joint programme it is not always in the network's capacity, nor may it add value, for LINK to attempt to bridge these. Our developing political strategy is, nevertheless, to monitor and work in all environmental policy areas, aware of our strengths and weaknesses in so doing, and, also, to bear in mind that initiatives might be best considered at the local, Scottish, UK and European & international levels – or mixtures thereof.

Members' Congress in November 2009 focussed on environment and the economy, with various speakers, workshops and plenary on the role of the economy in a sustainable Scotland. This included interesting discussion of alternatives to GDP as a measure of progress. LINK has sought to engage others in debate over much-needed alternatives to GDP, as a means of evaluating Scotland's progress.

2009 saw the development of a system of Board and network reassessment of advocacy priorities every six months based on our regularly updated political strategy report from Parliamentary Officer Andy Myles. This allows the network, its member organisations and its task forces, to keep abreast of the complexity of political developments and to watch the political horizon at all levels for developments affecting Scotland.

Board overview

LINK's Board held face-to-face meetings four times this year, monitoring progress against operating plan and key performance indicators, advising on priorities in relation to political strategy and allocating available resources in support key ambitions. At its subgroup level the Board was involved in recruitment, staff support, reassessment of funding strategy, and strategic liaison with public sector bodies.

The Board undertook a review of the benefits which LINK offers to a wider network of partners, which resulted in proposals for a new category of *organisational supporter*, which will be developed next year. The Board has reassessed the constitutional position regarding trustee tenure and will propose amendments to the AGM in June 2010, which should ensure that trustees with experience are not 'recycled' too swiftly in future.

On the Board, Ian McCall, a long-time trustee and an active member of the network on the Ramblers Scotland staff until spring 2009, took over from John Mayhew as Chair in June 2009. Deborah Long has continued as Vice Chair and David Downie as Treasurer. Vicky Junik was elected to the Board at the AGM in June 2009. One elected trustee place has been vacant during the year. The complement of elected trustees is likely to drop to 9 as a result of the review of tenure referred to above. Ian Findlay and Mike Robinson were co-opted to the Board

in early autumn 2009 bringing useful expertise in fundraising, governance and organisational development, amongst other things. Ian Findlay subsequently resigned in January 2010.

A successful search for a successor as Treasurer to take over from David Downie in 2010 has identified Paul Ritchie who will take over in June 2010. David Downie has served in this capacity on LINK's Board since 2002, supporting development of LINK's financial, operational and HR processes. LINK's skills audit has been updated to inform future recruitment: the Board recognises that identification of new volunteers and 'fresh blood' is important to LINK's future management and direction.

At the 2009 AGM Helen Zealley was unanimously re-appointed President, and is completing her second year in this ambassadorial role. Helen draws on considerable experience in the public health sector in her advice and support to LINK and its work, and the network has had the benefit of her active engagement in several initiatives including our work on Single Outcome Agreements and in high-level liaison meetings with the Minister and Agencies. Many of LINK's honorary fellows continued to participate in network activity during the year.

Task forces

Making up a very important dimension in LINK's management over the period were Task Forces, their Convenors and their Deputes. The investment by Convenors and Deputes in leading task forces and ensuring delivery of their work plans is donated voluntarily by their employing organisations. Thanks to all the individuals involved and to Archaeology Scotland, Association for the Protection of Rural Scotland, Buglife, Marine Conservation Society, National Trust Scotland, Plantlife, RSPB Scotland, Scottish Wildlife Trust, Woodland Trust Scotland and WWF Scotland for their leadership of these groups.

Staff

Also key to the organisation's effectiveness is the small staff complement. Staff provide vital coordinating and advisory support to the organisation, its task forces and Board; this includes all financial administration, fundraising, provision of regular parliamentary and policy information to members, parliamentary liaison, support with projects, provision of workshops and other events, management of services to members and wider partners and audiences, HR and administration. The core staff complement dropped very slightly over the year to the level of 4.5 full time equivalent posts, actually delivered by six staff, some working part-time. Through the marine project there are also two project officer posts. LINK's is a lean staff complement in comparison to many other networks in the Scottish voluntary sector. Ylva Haglund and Adean Lutton left LINK for other jobs in June 2009 and November 2009, respectively. Kate McColl joined the organisation as Information & Admin Support Officer in January 2010.

The Year in retrospect

LINK has delivered against much of its operating plan for 2009/10, revisiting aspirations at quarterly networking meetings, reassessing priorities as capacity and policy contexts demanded. In financial terms this was delivered on a leaner budget than the original with LINK's budget revised downwards to achieve economies early in the reporting year.

Legislation

This has been a significant year in legislative terms, for LINK members, pulling together policy work and advocacy over two decades on three areas, each of which can make important contributions to sustainable development. Through LINK members were major contributors to and influencers of Scottish legislation on Climate, Sustainable Flood Management and Marine environmental management. We were public acknowledged and thanked by Parliamentarians of all five parties for our contribution as an important stakeholder at each of the Stage 3 debates in the Scottish Parliament. LINK members are very pleased with all three pieces of legislation though acknowledge that the real job of making these deliver in practice is about to begin and that NGO and wider societal pressure are crucial if we wish the spirit of these Acts to be implemented.

Some highlights

This year LINK established a new task force on *Sustainable Land Use Strategy*, following on from an eNGO initiative which secured a legislative commitment to such a Strategy in the Climate Change (Scotland) Act (2009). LINK bodies have often made the case for a strategic assessment of land use, and took the opportunity to commission *Living with the Land*, a report identifying the scope and approach of a sustainable land use strategy for Scotland. Its launch in December 2009 was well received by parliamentarians and the Scottish Government, with which discussions on scope and content have since developed.

Recognising the intention that national commitments be delivered through the Concordat with Scotland's 32 local authorities and the Single Outcome Agreement (SOA) process and aware of our limited resources for engagement across all these Councils, LINK commissioned work identifying key environmental 'headings' where members will look for delivery of national objectives. Working for sustainable development through Single Outcome Agreements published in early 2010 highlights: climate change, footprint & consumption, transport, water and flooding, historic environment, biodiversity, physical activity and health, education, landscape, recreational access. LINK is beginning to monitor how these issues fare across Scotland and in national government treatment in the lead up to the Scottish Parliament elections in 2011 and local government elections in 2012.

In early 2010 LINK commissioned a report on strategic planning needs in Scotland to support the sustainable development of what will be a key industry, marine renewables. *Avoiding conflicts in the marine environment* will be published in May.

LINK's sixth Scottish Environment Week in Holyrood demonstrated yet again that the environment is GREAT! – for business, communities, children, health and very much more. The Week affords politicians and parliamentarians opportunities to consider the contribution which Scotland's environment makes to people's lives, our wellbeing, and to the economy. Many of LINK's members took an active part in the lunchtime and evening seminars and midweek reception. Thanks go to this year's financial sponsors for the Week, Historic Scotland, Scotlish Natural Heritage and SEPA, and to Sarah Boyack MSP for hosting the event at Holyrood.

Political strategy at Scottish, UK and European levels

LINK's parliamentary forum met three times during the year, exchanging information about policy and politics, informing political strategy development and organising an excellent advocacy training day for members in July 2009. A number of members made up the LINK contingent at the Scottish conferences of all the main political parties over the year; LINK chose to promote marine and climate issues with politicians at 2009 conferences, whereas spring 2010 conferences concentrated on the coming Westminster elections.

With the UK parliamentary elections, and subsequent Scottish, local and EU elections in focus, LINK has this year compiled a set of sustainability 'asks' of politicians at all these levels, which will be published in LINK's Manifesto. On this basis members will have a rolling programme allowing for review and discussion of the environmental agenda as a whole, and helping to set individual organisational initiatives in perspective. The Manifesto will be reviewed annually and will allow the whole policy community to have a broad indication of our joint and several thinking.

Staff met EEB UK representatives at Green Alliance in September and also with staff from other Links, to consider how EEB members in the UK can be kept better informed about opportunities and progress at the European level. The opportunity was taken to explore impacts of a possible 'hung parliament' resulting from the Westminster Parliamentary elections. As the election nears, the polls indicate a real possibility of a hung Parliament, in which Scotland's experience of working in a politics of negotiation may be of advantage to our colleagues in Westminster. LINK supported member bodies in holding hustings in constituencies across Scotland to give local voters an opportunity to question parties' local candidates about climate and environment issues. LINK provides guidance on organising hustings meetings via its website. As the election drew closer events were planned in Edinburgh, Glasgow, Kingussie, Crieff and Haddington, many in partnership with other NGOs under the Ask the Climate Question banner.

Policy advocacy

Over the year LINK has responded to inquiries, provided briefings to MSPs and other policy stakeholders, met with government Ministers, run seminars and submitted consultation responses. These are available at http://www.scotlink.org/public/policy/papers.php. LINK was also represented on participated in seventy stakeholder forums, many of which are Government-led. See http://www.scotlink.org/public/about/delegates.php for full details of these groups. Experience of these is varied though in general members find them valuable opportunities for the different sectors to explore issues and approaches, sometimes upstream of strategy being established.

Through its task forces and also through the Board the network liased over strategic and policy issues with Scotlish Government departments, SNH, SEPA, Historic Scotland, Forestry Commission Scotland, Marine Scotland, and a range of stakeholders within industry. LINK bodies worked in partnership with Stop Climate Chaos Scotland, with Eco Congregations and with Northern Ireland Environment LINK, Wales Environment LINK and Wildlife and Countryside Link. There has been close contact with SCVO, including support in establishing a carbon accounting tool for use by voluntary organisations across Scotland (CarbonLINK); LINK is represented on SCVO's Green Reference Group to promote the discussion of environmental Issues within the Scotlish Third Sector and on its policy committee.

Workshops

Besides the quarterly networking meetings at which members and task forces, LINK organised six workshops for members, addressing environmental justice, sustainable land use, fundraising, marine renewables and parliamentary advocacy, in some cases helping the membership to reach consensus on complex issues.

Communications

Staff and Textlynx, working together, this year completed a major overhaul of the LINK website http://www.scotlink.org/ with clearer signposting and simpler navigation. There have also been revisions to format and timing of both our monthly Bulletin to the internal audiences and thrice-yearly Newsletter to a wider audience including government and its agencies, funders, LINK supporters and subscribers.

From point of view of LINK's basic mission, 2009/10 has been a very good year, with membership rising, including both new and returning members – very much an endorsement of the added value LINK can provide to its member bodies. The organisation is aware of the 'squeeze' which the current recession places on voluntary sector bodies' funding and as a result, the Board's ambition has been to keep costs down. The Board has held subscription rates at 2008/09 levels.

Financial review

Overview and reserves policy

LINK closed the financial year with £122,744 in unrestricted funds. Of that figure £5,244 represents Fixed Assets.

The Board agreed to maintain within the unrestricted balance a figure of £61,000, amounting to three months' core operating costs, core staff commitment to projects and potential redundancies, in the event that the company had to be wound up. In order to be ready to respond to the likely tougher economic climate ahead, the Board has also decided to maintain £30,000 of unrestricted funds to be able to react if any of our major funders, or some of our members, were to have to withdraw their support fairly suddenly. This policy is kept under review each year.

The balance of £26,500 in available funds is largely as anticipated.

Income streams

While LINK income overall was £22,000 lower than last year, unrestricted income was £13,000 higher. This was mainly due to increased core cost recovery from projects, from increased income from meeting room rental and hosting an employee from another organisation in our Perth office, and from increased membership subscriptions.

As a membership organisation, members and Board set a goal in 2004 of raising at least 50% of essential costs through internal membership subscriptions by 2011, in order to reduce

reliance on external funding and demonstrate member bodies' commitment to the network. The Board is pleased that LINK has met this goal 12 months early. Due to a net addition of 3 members in 2009-10, subscription income for the year was £73,033 representing 51% of our essential expenditure during the year. This was achieved while at the same time freezing subscription rates, to support members through this difficult period.

Acknowledgements

LINK's other principle income streams are grants from Scottish Natural Heritage, Scottish Government and the Esmee Fairbairn Foundation, all of whom we would like to thank. These channels of support are vital to the network. Grant funding at the same level is promised by these funders for the coming financial year, but the available level of funding from 2011 onwards has still to be determined by these organisations.

Continued support from the Esmée Fairbairn Foundation and the Tubney Trust for marine advocacy is warmly acknowledged. We would also like to acknowledge the following contributions received towards its work this year, from:

- Historic Scotland, towards Scottish Environment Week 2010;
- Craignish Trust, supporting our work on Sustainable Land Use policy
- Perth & Kinross Council, for a Biodiversity conference
- The Inchcape Foundation, for our core work
- · WWF UK, for support with Links' Liaison.

Expenditure

LINK expenditure overall was £47,000 lower than last year, mainly due to smaller project spending. All budget areas of core unrestricted expenditure were also kept under tight control throughout the year, resulting in a reduction of £7,000 from last year. Nonetheless, the Board were able to fully honour the staff salary plan.

LINK contributed funds from its discretionary project fund during the year to a Sustainable Tourism publication developed by Visit Scotland, towards the costs of the Royal Society of Edinburgh's Climate Change Enquiry, and to the work of launching a Commemorative trust in memory of our late President, Fred Edwards. Discretionary funds were also allocated towards UK General Election work, and the development and publication of lobby documents on Single Outcome Agreements and the Common Agricultural Policy update. LINK also sponsored a one-day Fundraising training course for members.

Financial outlook

We start the new financial year in good shape, with a good level of core / unrestricted reserves and a conservative forward budget set by the Board which targets another small surplus in these funds. The Board has decided to designate £15,000 of unrestricted funds to the annual Discretionary project fund, the same level as last year.

However, the Board is aware that coming years may be more difficult, with both government and private grantors indicating uncertain funding and possible cuts to eNGO funding in general. These are difficult times for all sectors and the trustees are conscious of the programmes, posts and commitments relying on LINK funding, and the Board hopes to ensure that, whatever happens, we have a contingency plan in place to manage the impacts. LINK is

committed to trying to ensure continuing independence from government or any other non-NGO sector grantor, and this may lead to some tougher decisions ahead.

Review of our membership subscriptions policy is ongoing, in the context of these leaner funding futures, and for the coming year the Board is proposing to freeze subscriptions rates again, at the 2008-09 level.

LINK and its counterparts in England, Northern Ireland and Wales have secured a three-year extension to the marine project funded in all four countries by the Esmée Fairbairn Foundation and the Tubney Trust. About to enter its third year, this represents significant funding support which hugely helps the networks' effort to secure sound marine legislation for the UK's waters. The new phase of funding will support the Links well into the implementation phase of legislative commitments in the UK Marine and Coastal Access Act (2009) and the Marine (Scotland) Act 2010.

Scrutiny

The Company's financial management is based on careful planning, regular monitoring and reporting, and considered decision-making. The Board approves the annual budget every January and trustees receive reports on financial activity each quarter to determine whether action is needed to address variance between budgeted and actual expenditure. The Funding subgroup of the Board meets regularly and is responsible for recommending any additional Discretionary spend to the full Board over the budget year, as well as monitoring income and expenditure generally.

Volunteers

Voluntary investment and engagement by member organisations in LINK activity is central to the contribution LINK can make as a collective. On top of their payment of subscriptions, the thirty-five member bodies invest through staff-time and sometimes through the time of their voluntary trustees in LINK events, discussions, initiatives and management, and in representing LINK positions at wider stakeholder meetings and external events. A number of these bodies also support network activity in kind, providing meeting rooms and catering, the use of printing and other facilities, lending technical equipment and support, and sharing organisational policies and templates. The support of Honorary Fellows and sometimes of the trustees of member bodies for LINK's work is an important part of this picture.

Carbon Accounting

This year we have extended our reporting to include emissions from travel to LINKorganised meetings: our quarterly Board meetings and AGM, our annual members' Congress, and LINK workshops and training events for members.

Future direction

Resources

Looking ahead, the Board's priority will be to consider how to sustain and support the network – retaining member organisations through difficult times, advocating for environment to reserve its fair share of attention and funding despite recession. The Board's funding subgroup is reviewing the financial position, looking at various funding scenarios and will propose a new schedule of membership subscriptions for the next three years by October 2010.

New Organisational Supporter affiliation

The Board has taken time to assess its relationship with the wider environmental network including non-member NGOs, government agencies, green business and environmental consultancies. Many of these have become a part of LINK's information sharing network, share extensively in LINK discussions of policy and are linked to LINK in taking joint action on a wide range of issues. To formalize the relationship LINK has developed proposals for a new package of affiliation, which will be launched in autumn 2010. Existing Subscribers and Supporters will be contacted about this during summer 2010.

Forward work plan

Autumn 2009 membership discussions have informed the preparation of a new operating plan for 2010/11 in which environmental governance in Scotland, economy and environment, environment and the law, and manifesto work towards Scotland's parliamentary elections sit alongside detailed action plans of ten task forces.

The focus of LINK's parliamentary strategy will be legislative delivery rather than new Bills and the organisation will be proposing issues for inquiry treatment to some of Holyrood's committees. A LINK bill team is actively inputting to proposed Wildlife and Natural Environment legislation.

LINK plans several public events including a seminar with Local Authority Biodiversity Plan Officers in June and a conference on sustainable land use strategy, with the Centre for Scottish Public Policy, in autumn 2010. The Joint Links' September 2010 seminar will be an opportunity to explore the impacts of coalition government at Westminster, as well as opportunities and concerns for things environmental.

Advocacy training and media training days for members and others are in the summer diary. Members' congress in November 2010 will focus on environment and the law. Liaison is underway with the Holyrood Events Team for Scottish Environment Week in early March 2011.

Launching the Fred Edwards Trust

LINK and Capability Scotland are amongst several parties currently working through a small steering group to prepare for the launch of a new trust in October 2010 to commemorate Fred Edwards and to champion, through mentoring and more, the principles which Fred espoused of social justice, ecological integrity, economic literacy and a global world view.

Auditors

LINK's trustees confirm there is no information of which they are aware which is relevant to the audit, but of which the auditor is unaware. They have also indicated that they have taken appropriate steps to identify such relevant information and to establish that the auditors are aware of such information.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2010

1 Accounting policies

1.1 Basis of preparation

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The Charity has taken advantage of the exemption in Financial Reporting Standard No 1 from the requirement to produce a cash flow statement on the grounds that it is a small Charity.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005 and the Companies Act 2006.

The particular accounting policies are described below. They have all been consistently applied throughout the year and the preceding year.

1.2 Incoming resources

Donations are included in the year which they are receivable, which is when the charity becomes entitled to the resource.

Grants receivable are credited to the Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) in the year for which they are receivable.

Bank interest is credited to the SOFA in the year in which it is received.

1.3 Resources expended

All expenditure is included on an accruals basis and is recognised when there is a legal right or constructive obligation to pay for expenditure. All costs have been directly attributed to one of the functional categories of resources expended in the SOFA. The charity is not registered for VAT and accordingly expenditure is shown gross of irrecoverable VAT.

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include the audit fees and costs linked to the strategic management of the charity.

1.4 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows:

Fixtures, fittings & equipment

33% straight line

This policy only applies to assets costing £250 or more. Assets costing less that £250 are to be depreciated in full in the year of acquisition.

1.5 Pensions

The Charity operates a defined contributions pension scheme. Contributions are charged in the accounts as they become payable in accordance with the rules of the scheme.

1.6 Accumulated funds

Restricted funds are funds which are used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the Board Members for particular purposes.

Other charitable funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Board Members in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity.
