Dear First Minister,

On behalf of Scottish Environment LINK, we would like to extend our congratulations to you on your election as First Minister. Scottish Environment LINK is the forum for Scotland's voluntary environment community, with over 40 member bodies representing a broad spectrum of environmental interests with the common goal of contributing to a more environmentally sustainable society.

Scotland faces twin environmental crises of nature loss and climate change. The latest IPCC report, issued this month, made clear that humanity requires urgent action to protect our environment, and underlined the importance of restoring nature as part of this effort. A healthy environment with rich and diverse nature is fundamentally important to the health, wellbeing and prosperity of Scotland's people. However, Scotland has suffered a high level of historic nature loss and this is accelerating further, with 1 in 9 species at risk of national extinction.

The Scottish Government has shown considerable leadership on environmental issues in recent years, notably through the Edinburgh Declaration on biodiversity. It is essential that this leadership is now translated into action. There are several key issues and opportunities over the remainder of this parliamentary term which will require your firm leadership if we are to be successful in our environmental ambitions.

We call on you to reaffirm the Scottish Government's commitment to our natural environment by:

Nature protection and restoration

- Introducing legally binding targets for nature restoration in a Natural Environment Bill, with an overarching goal to prevent and halt declines across land and sea by 2030, and making significant progress towards restoration by 2045
- Effectively protecting 30% of Scotland's land and seas for nature by 2030 in line with the Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework
- Improving the existing MPA network by designating a suite of Highly Protected Marine Areas (HPMAs) covering at least 10% of our seas
- Supporting effective recovery programmes for Scotland's most threatened species







- Designating at least one new National Park and strengthening the role of all of Scotland's National Parks so that they lead nature recovery and a Just Transition
- Delivering sufficient and responsible public investment in nature restoration, with ambitious and resourced delivery plans for the Scottish Biodiversity Strategy
- Implementing the recommendations of the independent Deer Working Group Report to deliver more flexible and sustainable deer management and to assist peatland protection and native woodland establishment
- Continuing to demonstrate commitment to securing the future of Scotland's rainforest, a globally unique habitat along the west coast
- Following the current consultation, acting swiftly to deliver the Government's commitment to phase out the use of peat in horticulture
- Delivering the Wildlife Management and Muirburn Bill providing better protection for Scotland's birds of prey by licensing grouse shooting, as well as licensing muirburn to protect our peatlands, our vital carbon stores important for combating climate change
- Ensuring planning authorities and other decision makers are properly resourced to support
 delivery of the Fourth National Planning Framework (NPF4) as intended, with climate and nature
 at the centre of decision-making, securing biodiversity protection and enhancement, safeguarding
 our important natural assets and creating nature networks.

Farming and forestry

- Developing a new system of agricultural funding that supports our farmers and crofters in the transition to nature- and climate-friendly farming
- Reviewing funding support from the Forestry Grant Scheme to support land managers in establishing nature positive forests and woodlands

Circular economy

- Supporting a robust Circular Economy Bill that will limit waste and pollution and reduce our consumption of raw materials
- Launching the Deposit Return Scheme as planned on 16th August

Just Transition and human rights

- Incorporating the substantive and procedural elements of the right to a healthy environment in a Human Rights Bill
- Ensuring a Just Transition to Nature Positive and Net Zero across land and sea, and ensure that environmental restoration benefits all of our communities

Meaningfully involving workers, their trade unions, and communities in the development of plans
to deliver emissions reductions and restore nature, and increasing support for workers moving
industry, such as from oil & gas into renewable energy

LINK and our members are keen to work closely with the Scottish Government to deliver for our natural environment. We would be delighted to offer you the opportunity to undertake a site visit over the coming months to discuss the enormous potential in Scotland's natural environment.
