Dear First Minister

Subject: UK Government proposal for National Lottery Heritage Fund

We hope that what follows is based on a misunderstanding. In case it is not, we wish to bring to your attention an extremely concerning the possibility that the National Lottery Heritage Fund may be subsumed within an England-based body, as outlined in the letter below from colleagues in England, Wales and Northern Ireland to Pat McFadden MP, Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster. We are not party to the detail but have been informed that this is both a credible and imminent threat. Our colleagues in Wales are also writing to Wales Finance Minister, Mark Drakeford and Huw Irranca-Davies, Deputy FM of Wales.

This proposal, if developed, has extremely serious and worrying consequences for Scotland, Scotland's nature and Scotland's ability to drive the scale of action required to meet the Global Biodiversity Framework targets.

The National Lottery Heritage Fund is recognised as one of the very best funders for nature restoration. It has an efficient distribution system that brings vital impact for natural, cultural and built heritage. Messing with that at a time when the need for urgent action has never been greater – in relation to the Global Biodiversity Framework targets and national targets and Scottish Biodiversity Strategy too – would be a fundamental setback to Scotland's ambitions.

Indeed, this move could seriously affect Scotland's fair allocation of the funding, which has amounted to £1 billion, awarded in Scotland, since 1995. The Heritage Fund is the only funder able to fund significant landscape-scale projects across the UK, including, for example, the £8 million Landscape Connections project in Scotland's Solway Firth announced on Friday 6 June. That ability is irreplaceable.

We would be very keen to discuss this issue with you and lay out our considerable concerns. However, this is urgent - we have been led to believe Ministers in England will be discussing this early in the week beginning 9 June. We urge you to intervene in this matter and to raise concerns about bringing a UK wide funding stream under England agency control.
